

Human Rights and Global Citizenship

This course is the second course of three in the series Human Rights and Global Citizenship course for the Global Citizen Scholars program. The course builds on UHON 1418: Human Rights and Global Citizenship I and allows students to see an international perspective on human rights issues as they continue to develop the mindset and skills of a Global Citizen. It also allows them to use skills gained in CHNG 1008 Place as Text: From Exploration to Impact to learn about the study abroad site(s). The course will be a 4-week course with a 19-day study abroad component.

Students will have a whole semester plus the 6 instructional days before departure to serve as a foundation for the trip. The first course, UHON 1418 introduces human rights and global citizenship for students in the Honors Global Citizen Scholars program. The course provides an overview of the historical development of human rights and basic ethical theory, and introduce the concepts of global awareness, global responsibility, and global participation. Course topics for spring 2022 include the abolition of slavery as a case study for human rights and models of global citizenship, the legacies of slavery in the United Kingdom, modern day slavery in the UK, and migration and human rights in England and Ireland.

Dr. Kornweibel is a professor of English with a background in African American Literature and the Literature of the African Diaspora in the Americas. The most recent experience in her broad interdisciplinary background is 6 years teaching honors interdisciplinary humanities courses on historical and contemporary approaches to pressing human issues (such as justice, the social contract, oppression). She has travelled in England and Ireland briefly in the past and has previously led an undergraduate study abroad program to Barbados.



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Dr. Koterbay is a professor of Art History and Philosophy of Art in the Department of Art & Design and adjuncted to the Department of Philosophy & Humanities. He received his degrees from the University of St. Andrews, Scotland, has led study abroad courses and other educational experiences in London for ETSU and other organizations, and is intimately familiar with London in terms of practical issues (e.g. transportation, locations of institutions and sites associated with the course objectives, politics, history, customs) as well as broadly familiar with contemporary issues and dominant themes of the city in a localized fashion as well as to how it relates to the entirety of the UK.

COURSE

- UHON 2418 Human Rights and Global Citizenship II
- This is a required cohort course for the ETSU Global Citizen Scholars program. Students are required to attend.

ELIGIBILITY

- Current student eligible to enroll in ETSU courses,
- Good academic standing as defined by ETSU,
- No current disciplinary sanctions as verified by the ETSU office of student conduct (or equivalent). Students who become ineligible to attend the program after applying due to disciplinary sanctions will be subject to standard program cost penalty rates. Students are responsible for notifying the CCSA when they become aware of this ineligibility. For eligibility questions pertaining to disciplinary sanctions, students should contact the home campus.
- Students must complete home campus application prior to being registered in this course,
- Student must possess passport book valid for a least six (6) months after return date,
- Students must complete pre-departure orientations,
- Full payment prior to departure, and
- Permission of instructor(s) is required.

Participants younger than 18 will require a parent/guardian to accompanying as a reduced fee. Additional approvals will also be needed per international travel regulation, CCSA, and ETSU requirements.

ACCOMMODATION DETAILS

LOGISTICAL CONSIDERATIONS

- FAFSA. In order to qualify for financial aid, student should apply for FAFSA at time of application.
- **Money Matters:** If you have a credit/debit card or ATM card, inform your bank of travel dates to the United Kingdom. Recommend that you budget for at least US\$500 for personal expenses. Options to obtain British Pounds and Euros will be discussed in class sessions. <u>Here is the GPB/US\$ exchange rate.</u>

TERMS & CONDITIONS

- The selection process for this program requires a specific application provided by ETSU.
- Independent travel (*before and/or after the programs start and end date*) is permitted and must meet specific arrival and departure requirements.
- All participants will be held to your home campus Code of Conduct.
- All participants must complete BOTH the CCSA application and an ETSU application.



- Coaching is based on the final itinerary and maximum 9 hours driving per day. Coach travel has specific restrictions due to EU regulations that could impact final itinerary. All timings and distances for travel are approximate and subject to variable conditions such as weather, transportation interruptions, etc.
- Individual participant needs/requests may impact the costs for individuals.
- Individual and/or group cancellations may incur fees dependent on timing and/or other obligations made by CCSA on behalf of the program and/or individual student or program leader.
- Each participant must have a passport that includes an expiration date, which is 6 months beyond the last date of the program.
- Participants should be in good physical condition and be prepared to walk 4-5 miles a day.

INDEPENDENT TRAVEL

Independent travel only by permission of the ETSU Education Abroad Office: (https://www.etsu.edu/honors/studyabroad/contactus.php)

Those arriving their own air travel must arrive in London by a designated time and at a designated location that will be determined by March 1, 2022. Independent travelers who arrive at the designated airport in London near the same time as the group flight may ride the coach to the hotel if there is space on the coach. Group travelers board the coach first.

Those arranging their own departure must check out with program leaders by a designated time and at a designated location that will be determined by March 1, 2022. After the program leaders depart the hotel for the airport, anyone not on the coach will be considered an independent traveler and the program leaders are no longer responsible for such individuals.
